Found in Good Samaritan's front yard and brought to Tugaloo Animal Hospital

Transported to UGA CVM



Blue Heron

Appearance: Largest of the North American herons (four feet tall); long legs, a sinuous neck, thick, daggerlike bill, blue-gray color, wide black stripe over the eye.

Habitat: Shores of North and Central America, the Caribbean, and the Galapagos Islands

Hunting: Wade slowly or stand statue-like, stalking fish and other prey in shallow water

Watch for the lightning-fast thrust of the neck and head as they stab fish with their strong bills.





Handling Blue Herons


When found injured in the wild:

- Capture with a long-handled, large fishing net. If a net is not available, use a blanket or coat and Cover the entire bird before picking it up. If you must carry the bird in your arms, be sure to keep its beak away from your face.
- When handling for a physical exam, two things to avoid: The talons and the beak


Bite wounds

Radiograph results: Fracture on the right humerus




Radiograph results: Left toe fracture

Radiograph results: Right pelvic fracture






Multiple fractures, poor quality of life Euthanasia
